

What is the Constitution?

The Constitution is like a rulebook.




It is the foundation document of Australian government – an agreement between the Australian government and the public.



Why do we have referendums?

A referendum is a national vote in which Australians vote yes or no to a proposed change to the Constitution.




Australians have been asked 44 times if they would like to change the Constitution, but have only agreed to the change 8 times.



Why would we consider changing the Constitution?


The Constitution was written in the 1890s, and came into effect in 1901.

But is a document that's design allow it to be changed.






Why should I care about the Constitution?



The Constitution is the document that 'governs the government'. It provides guidelines for what the government can and can't do.






Who decides the outcome of a Referendum?

Voters decide on the outcome.

In order to make a change, a double-majority is required.



This means a majority of people in a majority of states must vote 'Yes' to a proposed change.

If there is no double-majority, the Constitution remains unchanged.
